Themes & Messages

- In what ways did Kemba's sheltered background and desire for independence shape the choices and risks she faced in college?
- How does Kemba's story challenge narrow definitions of exploitation and trafficking?
- What role did *power*, control, and grooming play in shaping her decisions?
- How did love, loyalty, and fear influence her and how do those emotions create blind spots to harm?
- What does the film teach us about how systems often miss or ignore early signs of manipulation or coercion?

Character & Story Exploration

 How did Kemba's relationship with Khalif evolve? What early warning signs were missed, ignored, or excused?



- In what ways did Kemba's environment - her campus, community, or social circles - contribute to her vulnerability?
- Did you notice any patterns of grooming or emotional manipulation in how Khalif gained Kemba's trust?
- Did Kemba recognize the manipulation or danger she was in while it was happening?
- What support systems might have helped interrupt or prevent her entrapment?
- How does Kemba's experience illustrate how young people, especially women of color, can be exploited and misunderstood rather than seen as needing support?

Connection to Real Life

- While Kemba's story wasn't classified as trafficking, what elements resemble situations traffickers often exploit?
- Can you see similar vulnerabilities or patterns happening on college campuses today?
- What red flags, grooming tactics, or patterns of coercion appeared in Kemba's story?
- How do traffickers or exploiters use grooming, especially through love or trust, to manipulate young people who may not see themselves as victims?
- How can we move beyond awareness to advocacy and survivor-centered action?
- What can families, schools, and peer groups do to create safer environments and support early intervention?
- How can we move beyond awareness to advocacy and survivor-centered action?

- "I didn't see myself as a victim." What does this quote reveal about how trafficking survivors often experience their own story?
- Were there other lines that resonated with you or challenged your thinking?

- What signs of trafficking and coercion should college students be more aware of?
- How can we better support peers who may be in dangerous or manipulative relationships?
- How can students be better equipped to recognize grooming behaviors in romantic or social relationships?
- What actions can HBCU students and allies take to raise awareness and protect one another?
- How might this film inspire action or dialogue beyond today?
- What questions or reflections are you carrying forward?
- Is there something you want to learn more about, do, or discuss further?
